Revere Andrew Brown, 78, of Yakima, WA, died Tuesday, March 31, 1992, at Virginia Mason Hospital in Seattle, WA, after a short illness. Mr. Brown was born in Kellerton, IA, on April 24, 1913, to Roy D. and Grace Mabel (Andrew) Brown.

He had retired from the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a food and nutritional officer in Seattle. He had been a member of the Lions Club and the Toastmasters.

In 1946 he joined the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, serving as a deacon, elder, high priest and evangelist. He served on the Seattle Stake High Council and later in Central Washington District as a pastor, teacher, counselor and evangelist and was one of the originators of the church school busing program in Selah, WA.

At the age of 17, he married his childhood sweetheart, Anna Pauline Godgrey, who preceded him in death in 1979. On August 20, 1980, he

married Joyce (Wortham) Osborn, of Ellensburg, WA.

He was a volunteer for the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (R.S.V.P.), People for People, as well as Meals-on-Wheels. For several years he was a volunteer for the U.S. Forest Service in the Cle Elum District of the Wenatchee National Forest.

He is survived by his wife, Joyce Brown, of Yakima; a daughter and son-in-law, Lind Lee and Cecil Wilson of Yakima; three step-children, Paula and Robert Mathews, of Davis, CA; Jeff Osborn of Seattle; and Chris and Linda Osborn of Issaquah, WA; eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren, and a brother, Earl C. Brown of Highland, CA.

Besides his first wife, Anna P. Brown, he was preceded in death by two sons, Gary R. Brown and Kent L. Brown; his parents; a sister, Enid Marie Wise and brothers Virgil C. Brown and Bruce E. Brown.

Harold E. Constance, 84, Blue Springs, MO, a high priest of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, died March 9, 1992, at Independence Regional Health Center.

Mr. Constance was a member of the High Council of the Blue Valley Stake of the RLDS Church and was a member of the Colonial Hills congregation. He was past president of the Spokane WA District of the RLDS church; former pastor of the Blue Springs and Pleasant Hill congregations; and a past counselor to the presidents of the Blue Valley and Central Missouri stakes.

He was a building contractor until he retired 25 years ago, then was a traveling minister in Canada and in the western and southern United States under the direction of the first presidency of the RLDS World Church.

The funeral for Clarkston, WA, resident Pearl O. Dundas, 92, will be conducted at 11:00 a.m. Thursday, April 21, at Merchant Funeral Home in Clarkston. Officiating will be Marion Renfro and Ron Jones of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. She died of causes related to age Saturday, April 16, 1994, at Tri-State Memorial Hospital in Clarkston.

She was born October 18, 1901, at Evergreen, MN, to Carrie B. and R.D. Omans. She came with her parents by train to Kamiah, ID, in 1903 and attended schools there, graduating from Kamiah High School in 1919. The following year, she



attended Lewiston Normal School (now Lewis-Clark State College) for teacher training and took her first teaching position in a one-room schoolhouse near Winchester, ID. She later taught in the Kamiah School and also in a U.S. government-operated school for Nez Perce children in East Kamiah. Because of poor roads in those days, she often rode horseback ten miles each day to and from school.

She married John U. Dundas on May 7, 1922, at Kamiah. In 1924, they moved to Craigmont, ID, where they both worked for Grangeville Light and Power Co. They were later transferred to Lewiston, ID, where both were employed by the Washington Water Power Co. His poor health forced them to move to Pierce, ID, in 1937, where she taught for ten years at Pierce High School. She also was employed there as city librarian for a number of years. In 1964, they moved to Clarkston, where she worked as a teacher in Developmental Services of Asotin County for several years. She retired in 1981 and continued to live at Clarkston. Her husband died in 1966.

She had been a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints since 1914 and was active in the Clarkston (Lewis-Clark) WA Branch. She was also an active member of the Rebekah Lodge for more than 40 years, attaining the honorary degree of chivalry and serving as a past noble grand leader.

She was a member of Delta Kappa Gamma Association of Washington, a retired teachers organization, and had been active in the Tri-State Hospital Auxiliary. She was also a member of Clarkston Gerontology and enjoyed ceramics, leathercraft, painting, spending time in the outdoors and visiting with friends and family. In her younger years she was an avid fisherman.

Survivors include two brothers, James E. Omans of Chesterfield, MO, and R.D. Omans of Clarkston. A brother, Lloyd M. Omans, and a son, Lester, died previously.

Burial will be at Normal Hill Cemetery at Lewiston, ID. The family suggests memorials be

Walter Ervin Storey, a retired Lewiston businessman, died of cancer Friday at his Lewiston, ID, home. He was 84.

He was born June 7, 1908, at Page, WA, to James and Sarah Jane (Smith) Storey, the 11th of 13 children. He was raised at Dayton, WA, where he graduated from school. After completing his schooling, he worked as a desk clerk at the Dayton Hotel before moving to Spokane, WA.

While at Spokane, he worked for the Spokane Press as circulation manager. In the early 1930s, he moved to Lewiston to manage the circulation department of the Lewiston Morning Tribune. He left the Tribune in 1935 to start the W.E. Storey Music Co. at Lewiston, which he operated until retiring in 1973. In addition, he owned and operated a ranch in the Coeur d'Alene mountains near Cataldo, ID, which he later sold to his son, Ralph.



He married Beulah Garris in 1931 but they were later divorced. In 1946, he married Vivian Edwards. She died in 1978.

He enjoyed collecting coins and stamps and raising cattle and horses. He was a lifetime member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge and the Clarkston Country Club and was a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

Survivors include a daughter, Sarah Storey of Lewiston; four sons, Ralph Storey of Cataldo; Rod Storey of Lewiston; Gary Storey of Portland, OR; and Vern Storey of Spokane; two sisters, Gertrude Allen of Independence, MO; and Jane Johnston of Shelton, WA; 14 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren. Eleven brothers and sisters died previously.

Carl Otto Strand, a Clarkston, WA, resident and former Air Force airplane crew chief, died Friday, April 29, 1994, at Tri-State Memorial Hospital at Clarkston. He was 74. The cause of death is unknown pending medical certification.

Carl was born April 10, 1920, at Rochester, WA, to August Alfred and Emma S. (Gentala) Strand. He was the youngest of 14 children and attended schools at Rochester.

He served in the U. S. Air Force during World

War II in the 320th bomb squadron, 90th bomber group, as an airplane crew chief. He was in battles and campaigns in the south Philippines, Guadalcanal, north Solomon Islands, western Pacific, China, and New Guinea. He received a distinguished unit badge, Asiatic Pacific Campaign medal, Philippines Liberation Ribbon, and Good Conduct Medal.

After being discharged from the Air Force in 1945, he worked in auto-body repair in San Diego, CA, and in Chehalis and Pasco, WA. He became a salesman for Cornwell Tools Co. in 1962. In 1975, he became a Shaklee distributor and supervisor until he retired in 1982.

Strand's first marriage ended in divorce. He married A. (Alice) Marie (Faucett) Darling April 4, 1964, at Seattle.

Strand was an avid golfer and fisherman and enjoyed gardening. He was a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. As an elder in the church, he provided ministry for 50 years. Last year he helped remodel the church in Clarkston.
